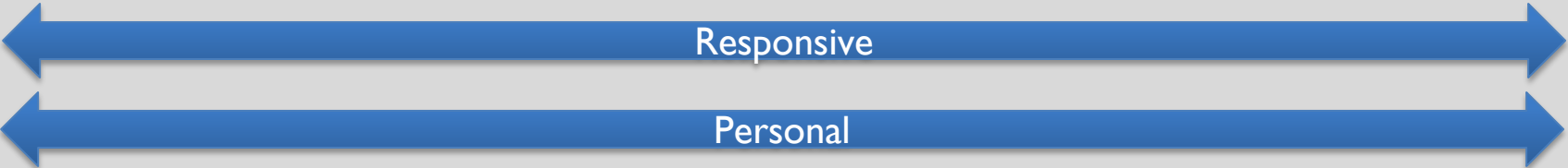

Curriculum Ontology

- Two key elements of the Curriculum Ontology:
 - **Programme of Study** = Level + Subject
 - **Topic of Study** = Programme of Study + Topics



Curriculum Ontology

- Aims to:
 - Provide a model of the national curricula across the UK
 - Organise learning resources, e.g. video clips and revision content
 - Allow users to discover content via the national curricula
- Will be available:
 - Under a creative commons licence
 - For anyone who wishes to use it

Prejudice & practicalities

Before the twentieth century, it was generally agreed that women had no place on the battlefield.

In the First World War, women played a significant role at the front line for the first time. High levels of casualties meant women had to do jobs previously done by men – including driving ambulances and tending men right at the front lines. The biggest role for women was caring for the many casualties from the trenches

Nursing was mostly a middle-class profession. This was partly a matter of prejudice, but partly down to practicalities. Only those with money could support themselves while training – or afford to buy their own uniforms.



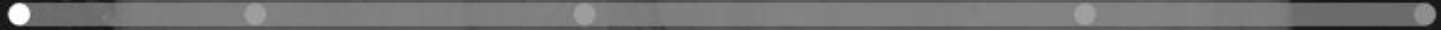

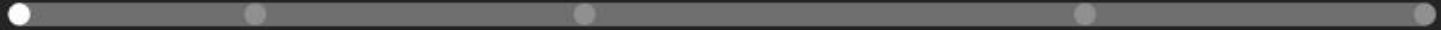

The Longest Day

The D-Day landings are a success - Hitler is now living on borrowed time.

By now, over 170,000 men are fighting in Normandy, with more arriving throughout the night. Some 4,000 British and Canadian soldiers, plus 6,600 Americans, have already been killed, but losses are lower than expected. In a heartfelt broadcast to the British Empire, King George VI encourages the troops: "After nearly five years of toil and suffering, we must renew that crusading impulse on which we entered the war and met its darkest hour." Which is exactly what the Allies have done, making the D-Day landings a big success. It's the end for the Nazi regime.

Schools

- ICT – made by Fish in a Bottle. Mainly KS1, but also includes an updated version of the ever popular Dance Mat Typing – which could be used by both KS1 & KS2.

2013/14:

- Identifying gaps in content likely to be small interactives and resources for teachers to use on the whiteboard (eg infographics/explainer video or animation).
- Science is the next big priority for KS1/2

2012/13:

- Job Skills – printable learning content taking a functional skills approach to literacy and numeracy (Splinter)
- Prototype Apprenticeships content - R&D commission exploring how literacy/numeracy content may be structured for independent learners, using apprenticeships subject matter (Illumina)
- Additional content to support Rip Off Britain

- Publish new Job Skills content in Skillswise
- In development – Functional Skills for Apprenticeships

Key Commissioning Themes

Aim to create, connect and magnify powerful opportunities for Learning

- Enhance existing commissions
- Develop and co-commission original ideas
- Open to ideas across general learning
- Ideas that inspire and connect to knowledge and skills development beyond a programme

Priority Subjects – Literacy and Numeracy

Literacy:

- Raise awareness for general audiences e.g. Daytime audiences
- Tell real life stories that inspire those with skills needs e.g. BBC Three documentaries
- Model family learning around basic skills through events e.g. Mr Bloom and Friends roadshow

Numeracy:

- Utilising consumer programmes to improve audience understanding of figures

Priority Subjects – Science and Health

Science:

- Programmes with strong curriculum relevance
- Programmes relevant to young audiences
- Content that can extend to a family audience

Health:

- Focus on the science of health and understanding the body

Priority Subjects – Work Skills

Work Skills:

- Inspiring audiences to improve work skills such as inventiveness and creativity
- Priority audiences are school age and younger adult audiences
- E.g.:
 - Ye Olde Dragons' Den
 - Radio 1 Academy
 - The Learning Zone
 - The Real Apprentices



Priority Subjects – Media Literacy

Media Literacy:

- BBC Learning's approach to media literacy is:
 - Access
 - Understanding
 - Creativity
- Seek to develop the media literacy of all audiences including:
 - Inspiring people to get online
 - "Up-skilling" audiences who want to learn more
- Inspiring young people and their parents around digital creativity and coding

TV and Formal Learning

- BBC Learning utilises mainstream commissions
 - Clips from broadcasts
 - Creating re-versioned shorts
- The Learning Zone also commissions original content tied to the curriculum
- The Learning Fund invests in mainstream programming that delivers curriculum content e.g. BBC Three My Murder



The Learning Fund

Recent investment:

- BBC One – Britain's Big Wildlife Revival
- CBeebies – Magic Hands
- Radio 2 – 500 Words



The Learning Fund:

- Ambitious ideas with the potential to become larger seasons
- Ideas that use broadcast talent in the learning content
- Ideas that support wider BBC objectives as well as delivering learning outcomes

Co-Commissioning Daytime

Recent commissions:

- Rip-Off Britain “pop-up” shop

Co-Commissioning Daytime:

- Drama and factual programmes to raise awareness of the UK’s adult literacy and numeracy needs
- Content that inspires a general daytime audience to develop new skills
- Ideas for how Daytime can support our science and health objectives
