

PROGRAMME INFORMATION

Nóra picks flowers in the garden before she says "good morning" to the sun, and wakes up her brothers and sisters.

They all say "good morning" to the sun, before singing their breakfast song and getting their breakfast ready.

After brushing their teeth and changing out of their pyjamas, the magic bubble machine shows them how Eoghan and his brother Lochlann brush their teeth.

Then Nóra reads them a story about a boy who gets up early every day to say "good morning" to the sun.

After storytime, the twins want to go outside to greet the sun, but Naoise can't come - his shoe laces are untied, and they have to help their little brother get ready. Then they all put on their hats before going out to the garden to say good morning to the sun.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

- **Language development**

Vocabulary relating to morning routines and eating and drinking is both introduced and reinforced.

- **Personal development and movement**

Na Dódaí demonstrate co-operation and respect for others as they get ready for a new day.

They show an awareness of and appreciation for the natural world, the heat and light of the sun, the beautiful flowers in their garden.

They demonstrate clearly how much they enjoy going outside to play, and they show a good example by eating a healthy breakfast and brushing their own teeth.

Nóra encourages the twins to help their little brother, who is not yet able to do all the things they can do and they feel good about themselves when they help him get ready to go out and play.

- **The Arts**

Music plays a large part in their morning routine, and through the use of different instrumentation and tempo, the same melody is used to highlight different feelings and emotions.

Ruairí uses role-play based on the story when he goes outside to greet the sun.

- **The world around us**

Na Dódaí obviously love their garden, the colour and scent of the flowers adds to their happy mood. The twins indicate how the heat and light of the sun helps the garden, and themselves to grow.

The story subtly points out the differences between daytime and nighttime, light and dark.

SUGGESTED ACTIVITIES

1. If there is space available, plant flower seeds or bulbs outside the classroom. The children can water them, and watch as they grow.
2. Alternatively, plant cress or alfalfa seeds on moistened cotton wool and leave on a sunny window to sprout – these can then be included in a sandwich at break-time.
3. Use puréed strawberry to make pink Dódaí milk for breaktime – try making different coloured drinks using other fruits puréed into smoothies with either milk, fruit juice or yoghurt
4. Use chopped fruit at break time to make smiley faces and flower pictures – which can then be eaten.
5. If your school has no garden then make one on a wall inside your classroom. Children use small paper plates to make and paint flowers, these are then grouped around a big yellow sun to make a colourful display.


