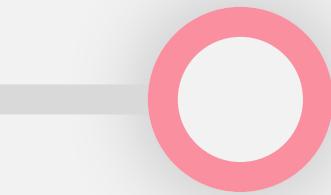


Risks in the Film & TV Industry

Children who work in the film and TV industry may face several risks, including:



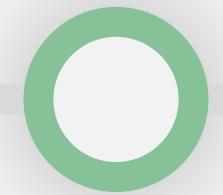
Physical & Emotional Stress

There have been cases of child exploitation and abuse in the entertainment industry. It is crucial to ensure that children are protected from any form of exploitation or mistreatment.



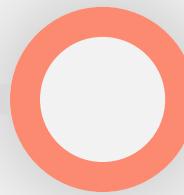
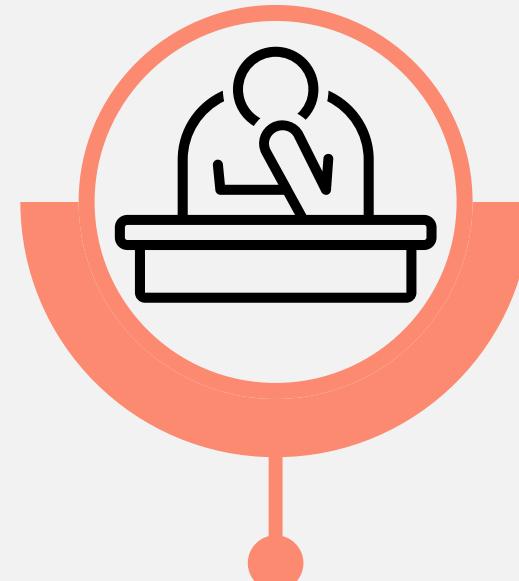
Lack of Normality
