Free at Last? **Race relations in the USA** **1918–1968**

These two programmes have been designed to meet the requirements of the SQA Intermediate History course arrangements. They provide resources for the unit entitled

Both programmes cater for students at both Intermediate 1 and Intermediate 2 levels. Programme One focuses on the period 1918–1929 and Programme Two covers 1945–1965.

Programme One **Race Relations in the USA 1918–1929**

Synopsis of Content

This programme looks at the development of race relations in the USA during the years 1918–30, illustrating themes of ideas, identity and power.

The programme's main focus is on the USA at the end of the First World War. It covers the social, political and economic status of African Americans, the 'Jim Crow' laws, voting rights, the Great Migration, the attitudes and activities of the Ku Klux Klan, and the African American churches.

Programme Two **Race Relations in the USA 1945–1965**

Synopsis of Content

This programme looks at the development of race relations in the USA during the years 1945–68, illustrating themes of ideas, identity and power.

The programme's main focus is on the growing demand for civil rights after 1945. It covers the reasons for this growth, including the peaceful campaigns of the civil rights movements during the 1950s and 60s, the role of Martin Luther King, the response of state and federal authorities to these campaigns and an assessment of the impact of the campaigns on US society.
