

## Weatherman Walking - Moel Famau




The Weatherman Walking maps are intended as a guide to the TV programme only. Routes and conditions may have changed since the programme was made.

**Approximate distance: 4.5 miles**

An upland walk passing through heather moorlands and ancient burial cairns to North East Wales' most iconic peak.

**1. Bwlch Penbarras car park - The start**

From the Bwlch Penbarras car park head up to Moel Fenlli, an impressive Iron Age hillfort which has stood for 2,000 years.

Its defences are still visible today.

**4. Heather moorlands**

The heather is controlled by cutting and burning to ensure that plants are kept young and healthy and space is available for sheep and wildlife to congregate.

**2. Audio guides**

Loop back down to the car-park, and follow the main path to Moel Famau.

You can access audio guides here for your mobile. Each sign post has a number to dial.

**5. Moel Famau and the Jubilee Tower**


The summit of Moel Famau is marked by the remains of a tower built to celebrate the golden jubilee of George III.

It was destroyed in a storm and never completed.

**3. A Bronze Age burial chamber**

A short diversion off the main route brings you to the burial site.

4,000 years ago a stone built, turf-covered chamber faced out over the Vale of Clwyd.

**6. Back down to Bwlch Penbarras - The end**

The route down passes through Forestry Commission land.

Pine forest is being replaced with native trees and heather. A large, wooden black grouse lurks nearby.
