P R E R E A D I N G T E X T		5	<p>Generate interest about today's topic by asking students how much they know about kings and queens of the world. Divide the class into two teams and ask one person from each team to come to the board and fill in one blank of the table at a time. 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	Pre-teach essential vocabulary	10	Elicit/present key vocabulary that students need either to understand the key points in the text or to understand and/or answer any questions that you'll set them later in the lesson. The vocabulary is from Words in the News (so you can elicit the vocabulary by using the explanations provided online or below). You could either pre-teach the vocabulary at this stage of the lesson or you could use the vocabulary building activity from																																		



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		<p>further down in this lesson plan.</p> <p>Have students working in small groups together and ask them to try to match the vocabulary with the definitions. Encourage them to work with the other groups to pool their knowledge. When they have done as much as they can, if they have dictionaries, ask them to look up the words to check their answers and to find out the definitions of any words they were not sure of. 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Activity	Approx time in mins	Teacher	Boardwork
Written record	5 - 10	Write the words on the board, eliciting spelling as you write. Elicit and show the word stress of each item and word class, if appropriate. Give students some time to copy your boardwork into their notebooks.	
Set a global question. Students read text the first time.		Tell the students they are going to read a text about Queen Elizabeth. Give them a time limit (1 - 2 minutes) to read the text quickly to find the answer to the question on the board: The point of this task is to get them to read the whole text quickly. It's not important at this stage that they understand every word of the text.	British people want to stop having a queen True or False?
Check answer	2 - 3	Elicit students' answers and underline the correct answer on the board. Paragraph 3 says 'There is no obvious appetite in Britain for any other form of government'	British people want to stop having a queen True or <u>False</u> ?
Set specific information questions	5	Use worksheet A or the online quiz to help students understand the text in more detail. Give students a time limit (5 - 6 minutes) to read the text again in more detail and to answer the questions.	
Check specific information answers	2	Elicit answers True or False. Direct attention to a particular paragraph if an answer is wrong to try to elicit correct answer (see worksheet A and answer key).

	Activity	Approx time in mins	Teacher	Boardwork
	Grammar focus	5 - 10	Use worksheet C to focus on homographs (words that are spelled the same but which have different meanings). Tell students to write two example sentences for each word.	
	Check answers	3	If an answer is wrong, ask other students to try to elicit correct answer. (see worksheet C and answer key)	
	Follow-up activity: writing	15	<p>Tell students they are now 80 years old! Ask them how they feel, are they happy, sad, ill, well, living with family or living alone? Ask other questions to guide them to an image of the kind of old person they are. Tell them they have just had news that one of their children has had a baby. They are now grandparents, congratulations! They are going to write a letter of welcome to their new grandchild and give him or her some advice from their long life. What things do they wish for the new baby? What things do they wish they had or hadn't done during their life?</p> <p>Tell students they will work by themselves. Give them 5 minutes to brainstorm ideas for their letters and plan their writing and 5 - 10 minutes to write their letters.</p> <p>Circulate, while they are working, giving help with grammar and spelling, if necessary.</p>

	Feedback		<p>Collect the students' work. If possible, stick it up where everyone can see it.</p> <p>Ask the students to walk round the room reading the letters and to think about which one that would have like to receive when they were born.</p> <p>Give praise for content (for work that had all useful advice).</p> <p>Give praise for correct examples you saw.</p> <p>Give feedback on incorrect examples you saw and elicit corrections.</p>	<p>Examples:</p> <p>You've got your whole life ahead of you! (ü)</p> <p>Remember that love is the more important than anything! (ü)</p>
